On the May Day Bank Holiday, we held our first Dawn Chorus Walk of the year. Seventeen bird enthusiasts were taken for a tour around the park, where they listened to and saw many birds. Highlights included a Cuckoo, Mistle and Song Thrushes, a Treecreeper accessing its nest in a tree and, on the main pit, a Little Grebe with chick. The tour ended with a delicious breakfast at Jenny Wren's café.

The Country Park remains a popular destination but it's also a Local Nature Reserve and much work lately has gone into the encouragement of wildlife at the park. Our second Breeding Birds Survey is taking place from April till June and it will give us an indication of trends for our resident birds and also the summer visiting birds that come over this time of year.

# A Food and Drink Festival Treat

The Taste of Sudbury Festival is moving to Melford for 2022 and will be held in the grounds of Melford Hall on Saturday 18th June from 10am to 5pm. It will be a celebration of local food and drink, with lots of stalls from local producers and



retailers and a central stage with demonstrations by top local experts. These include the owner of the Lavenham Butchers and the head chefs from the Rattlesden Arms and the Northgate in Bury St Edmunds

### £750K Raised for Local Good Causes

At last, the Neighbourhood Plan is reaching its final stages. An independent examiner has reviewed the Plan and recommended that it can proceed to a village referendum, subject to some modifications.

Babergh will arrange the referendum. If a majority of those voting are in favour of the Plan, it will sit alongside Babergh's planning rules and must be taken into account when considering any planning applications for building new homes.

We are currently making the necessary changes to the Plan. We are also considering how best to present the Plan to villagers before the vote takes place.

# Thursday 2nd June Lighting of the Beacon – 9.15pm for 9.45pm

Along with over 1,500 other Beacons throughout the UK, the Long Melford beacon on the Upper Green will be lit at 9.45pm to celebrate the Queen's 70th year as Monarch. Beacons will also be lit in every Commonwealth country.

A ceremony in front of the beacon, led by Holy Trinity's Rector Matthew Lawson, will start at 9.15pm. It will be opened by a Town Crier, followed by hymns, a bugle call and the National Anthem.



It will culminate in the lighting of the beacon by Jean, Lady Hyde Parker and be followed by a peal of the church bells and the playing of the new 'Song for the Commonwealth'.

It should be a great occasion, so why not go along, join in the fun, and celebrate our Queen's remarkable achievement?





# **Preserving Melford's National Treasure**

Everyone in Melford knows our medieval church is impressive. But how many realise its stained glass is a treasure of national importance?

Nine-tenths of English medieval stained glass was smashed in the Reformation and the Civil War. Our church, built with the wealth of the wool trade, wasn't immune. However, the sheer number of windows in our vast building made it hard to destroy all the glass.

The windows that survive, in eight bays of the north aisle, are unique in England. They mainly depict family and friends of the principal funder of the church, John Clopton of Kentwell Hall. The windows show the great and good of the day, providing an unparalleled record of costumes and hairstyles.

After centuries of corrosion and microbial growth, this magnificent piece of heritage is in peril. We need to clean and protect the glass, not just to restore its brightness but to ensure it survives for future generations. This will cost around £800,000.

# "Blown away by the generosity of the people of Long Melford"

"When we saw the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine unfolding, we decided we needed to do something", says 36-year-old Nick Stearn from Diss, a locksmith and exsoldier with three combat tours under his belt.

Fundraising and generous donations allowed him and his team to deliver three ambulances (and a support vehicle) filled up with much-needed medical supplies and baby and

# Driving through a warzone

Eight volunteers drove from Suffolk to Poland. Five of them – wearing body-armour and helmets – crossed the border from Poland into Ukraine, 1,200 miles in total. Driving through a war zone they knew that being attacked was a possibility, but still "every single one of us was prepared to do it. The scenes along the road into Ukraine were harrowing," says Nick.



# Those Were The Days, Or Were They?

During the 70 years of the Queen's reign, the sheer scale and pace of change has been amazing. Her reign is a living history.

The Queen has seen 18 General Elections during her reign and 13 American Presidents come and go (for how many Prime Ministers, do the Quiz on page 23). Astonishingly, at the beginning of Elizabeth II's reign, Joseph Stalin still ruled the roost in the Soviet Union as did Chairman Mao in China. Pause for thought – perhaps some things aren't that different in today's world.

The Britain of today is very different from the Britain of 1952. In the early 1950s, the UK population was around 50.6 million; it's now over 67 million. For those born in the early 1950s, life

expectancy was 66 years for men and 71 for women; for babies born in 2022, it's 88 for men and 90 for women.

All fit young men, aged from 17, had to do two years national service. The school leaving age was just 15. Capital punishment, in the form of hanging, could still be imposed. Abortion was illegal. Homosexuality wasn't decriminalised until the late 1960s. Green issues were but a distant dream. City winter peasoupers were frequent. The Great Smog of London in December 1952 is estimated to have caused 4,000 deaths.

Home ownership is now around 65%; back in the early 50s it was half that. The average price of a house was £1,890, that's £60,000 in today's money... if only. The average house price is now £261,000.

# **Coronation Day Party 1953**

We contacted two of the children, who still live in Melford, pictured in fancy dress in this photo at the party outside the 'old green hut' – the original British Legion. Colin Woodhouse, sixth from the right, and still rocking with Route 66, can only remember being dressed as Fu Manchu. Audrey Wreford (née Reeve), fourth from the right and wearing a crown, remembers she had a lovely time and that the children were excited and overjoyed. She also remembers that the weather was good but admits that children never remember rainy days.

Back in the early 1950s, there were no motorways; no breathalysers; no compulsory wearing of seat belts and no satnav. Around 4 million cars were registered – it's now approaching 33 million. In 1952, a gallon of petrol cost 4s 3d (21p); it would now cost £7.27.

It wasn't until 1954 that the rationing of all foodstuffs ended.

Home computers, the internet and social media were decades away. In the early 1950s, the BBC was the only TV channel. Not

everything has changed – Sooty made his TV debut in 1952 and is still going strong. The televising of the Coronation in 1953 increased TV ownership from around 1.4 million in 1952 to 2.1 million a year later.

Those are some of the national changes since the 1950s but what of Long Melford? The children pictured at the two Coronation parties here grew



up in a very different village to the Melford of today. Back then there were more pubs, more independent shops and fewer houses. Imagine Melford without not just recent developments, but others including Harefield, Roman Way, Southgate Gardens and Sampson Drive.

What will life and Melford be like in another 70 years?



# Save Our Swifts

The sound of swifts is one of the highlights of summer. But not for much longer unless we do something to stop their rapid decline. Numbers have fallen by 50% in the last 25 years. There are two main reasons for this; lack of food and lack of breeding sites, and we can do something about both – so this is a call to **SAVE OUR SWIFTS!** 

These remarkable birds spend most of their life on the wing, only coming to land to rear their young. They travel over 4,000 miles from Africa to breed, spending 12 to 15 weeks of summer with us.

Swifts are insect eaters, so everyone can help them by encouraging insects. Planting more insectfriendly plants, leaving areas of long grass, having a pond and log piles and a less tidy garden are easy ways to increase insect life.

# Free nest boxes available

The other thing we can do is to provide swift nest boxes. The historic houses in Long Melford were



once widely used by swifts, which nested in the roof space gaining entry under the eaves. However, many houses have been modernised and the traditional entry points have been lost, so we need to provide external boxes. Swifts are gregarious and loyal to the area where they were born. Young swifts that are ready to breed will search for a suitable nest site near others. Playing recordings of swift calls near newly installed boxes greatly increases the chances of them being used. Unlike swallows and house martins, that can be very messy, swifts make good house guests and it's possible you can have them in your roof without even knowing they are there.

If you have space 4 to 5m above ground, preferably north or east facing and would be willing to have one or more swift boxes, please get in touch with me. We'll arrange to get the boxes put up for you and can lend you a sound box to play the calls. Take a look at www.suffolkwildlifetrust.org/swifts to learn more about these remarkable birds and the Save our Suffolk Swifts campaign.

# Gardening Matters – Notes from the potting shed


# Taking cuttings made easy...

Have you ever thought that taking cuttings might be tricky and only for experienced gardeners? Are you tempted by the prospect of free plants that will be just as beautiful as the one you have already? Well, here's a suggestion for how to take the easiest cuttings possible and increase your plant stock at absolutely no cost. All you'll need is sharp knife or secateurs and a jam jar.

Simply cut a piece from your plant about 15cm long and strip away with your fingers all the leaves except those on the top 4-5 cm. Place the cutting in a jam jar about one third full of water and watch as roots form on the cut end. Once a decent group of roots is visible, just transfer the cutting to a pot of damp compost or even garden soil and watch as it produces new leaves.

This works very reliably with herbs such as mint and basil (so that one supermarket pot can be made to last all summer), as well as with many perennials such as hebes, hydrangea, fuchsia and helichrysum. If you haven't seen roots within three weeks, just change the water and keep watching. With the perennials, avoid taking a piece with a flower or flower bud on it and choose one that has some signs of new growth between spring through to autumn.

We find virtually all cuttings treated this way produce roots. If you try this out and have success with it, do let us know and perhaps send in a photograph of your triumphs. Imagine how



popular you'll be with your neighbours if you can offer them cuttings of the plants they've been admiring in your garden. There are, of course, several other techniques for creating new plants from your existing stock but we find that this method is a great way to start out on the propagation adventure.

We hope the sweet pea challenge is giving you great pleasure and forming a beautiful display throughout the village. They'll go on producing blooms for months if you keep cutting the flowers.

Meanwhile, we're very much looking forward to seeing your marvellous entries in the Produce Show at the Village Fete on 9th July.

# An Update on Our GP Surgery

All GP surgeries must have a Patient Participation Group (PPG). Their function is to discuss practice issues and the patient experience with a view to improving the service. The group should include patients, carers and GP practice staff. Our PPG was recently re-formed under the chairmanship of Anne Hinds. We've since had two meetings with GP staff.

One big issue is having to phone in. The process of 'phone first' for all contacts was introduced at the start of the pandemic. This doesn't suit everyone – but the NHS has recently issued new guidance that GP surgeries are no longer required to operate on a 'phone first' basis.

# Why don't they answer the phone?

The PPG has pointed out that many patients have tried to phone the surgery and spent hours hanging on. The practice is aware of the problem and is working with its system supplier to resolve it.

In the meantime, it suggests that when patients phone and are told there are several people in front of them in a queue, they should hang up and call back later. This isn't ideal, but we'll continue to press for the matter to be resolved as quickly as possible.

Our practice has started to issue (via Facebook) updates on the number of weekly appointments undertaken. In the last week in April (the latest figures available when we went to press) the figures were: Telephone appointments 543; Face to face appointments 398; E-consults responded to 296; Missed appointments by patients 33.

These figures are for all appointments including nurses and other healthcare professionals as well as GPs. We've suggested that it would be helpful if the numbers could be split between the different groups. We've also asked how these figures compare with pre-pandemic appointments and were told that those figures were not available.

It's early days but the PPG hopes that, with the co-operation of the practice, we can work towards a better experience for the patients of Long Melford and Lavenham surgeries.

We asked the practice for input into this magazine article but received no response. You can contact Anne Hinds in writing c/o the surgery.




