GP surgery on the way to recovery


As we reported in our last issue, our GP practice is in special




Looking for local Christmas present ideas? Read on... Melford Memories

This wonderful book by Ernest Ambrose was first published in 1972. Now, 50 years later, it's been redesigned and reprinted and would make a wonderful Christmas present for anyone interested in Melford's history.

Ernest lived in Melford from his birth in 1878 to his death in 1973. The book tells of his recollections of Melford, starting with his schooldays and including chapters on poaching, the Church, Queen Victoria's Jubilee, the coming of cycles and cars, the football club and much more.

It costs just £9.99 and is available at Breakout, the Church shop and from the Long Melford Historical and Archaeological Society (LMHAS) and the Long Melford Heritage Trust. LMHAS and the Trust jointly funded this 50th Anniversary edition. Melford Memories will also be available to order from bookshops, online retailers and as an e-book.





Try the Church Shop

The shop in Holy Trinity has lots of items suitable for Christmas presents and stocking fillers, as well as a fine selection of Christmas and greetings cards.

Present ideas include notecards and pads, bookmarks, attractive tea towels, mugs and crockery, playing cards, earrings, soaps and bath salts, pencil sets, attractive tins (some filled with sweets) and an eclectic collection of books with something suitable for all ages.

Long Melford 2,000 Years Ago – learn more on 2nd December

talk on recent excavations in the village and what they have revealed about its past and everyday life in Roman times. Many of the interesting artifacts discovered will also be on display.

Until now, Melford has been described as a small roadside settlement of little importance in Roman times. But we can now stake a claim that it was one of the few Roman towns in East Anglia to have an official name and Kenneth will explain why Melford was important.

Melford in Bloom

Some of our winter plants should soon be coming into bloom – but most will bloom in late winter and early spring. We've chosen the blue and yellow of the Ukraine flag as our colour scheme, using simple plants such as pansies, polyanthus and wallflowers

Next summer we'll use a mix of surfinia petunias (so successful this year in our hanging baskets), scaevola, salvia (very visible this summer on the bridge) and, as our



main plant, geraniums which are long flowering and cope well with drier conditions. The centrepiece of our barrels will be cordylines, as we struggled a little to control the cosmos plants this summer.

Next summer's colour scheme will be white and two shades of pink, to ring the changes after this year's bold red, white and blue theme.

Heritage Matters

Ding Dong Merrily on High

The church bells will be ringing out over Melford this Christmas. We can enjoy hearing them but what do most of us know about the bells and the tower in which they're housed?

There are eight bells; four of which were made in 1744. They were made by Thomas Lester of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Westminster Abbey is home to some of his bells. Three of Lester's Melford bells were re-cast in the 1920s.

The smallest and lightest of Holy Trinity's bells weighs approximately ½ ton (around 250kg) and gives the lightest tone of top F. The heaviest bell

weighs ¾ ton (around 750kg) – about 10 times the weight of a fully grown male St Bernard. Linda Goodban, the Tower Captain, believes the current bells were hoisted up to the belfry through a trap door in the ringing chamber where they were positioned on the 300-year-old oak frame which is still in use.


Holy Trinity didn't originally have a tower but a spire. This was struck by lightning in 1710. The Georgians rebuilt it in brick as a tower. However, it was short and plain and not in keeping with the main

structure of the church, either in size or style. To celebrate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897, it was decided to change the tower. It was raised it to its current height of 118ft (almost 36 metres), intricate cornices were added, and the entire structure was finished with flint. It was completed in 1906.

The brickwork and footings of the spire and both towers can still be found within the structure giving us a 3 in 1 tower!

Linda hopes that all eight bells will be rung at Christmas but it depends on the availability of the ringers – aka the clangers.







Parish Council Matters

Overwhelming Support for our Neighbourhood Plan

At last, after six long years, we have a Neighbourhood Plan. In October's referendum 95% of the people who voted were in favour.

The Plan has now been 'made' (ie adopted) by Babergh District Council. That means that Babergh and our Parish Council will need to take the policies in the Plan (there are 24 of them) into account when considering planning applications in Melford. This puts us in a stronger position to oppose large developments and building on green field sites in Melford.

Thanks to everyone who voted and to past and present members of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group.

A Vacancy on the Parish Council

Richard Delderfield has moved to Australia to join his family there. He is a sad loss to the Council (and to the Village Hall committee, of which he was chairman) and contributed a great deal. The Council is looking for someone to co-opt onto the Council until the next election in May 2023. If you'd like to apply, the closing date is Monday 5th December; application forms are available at the Parish Council Office and can be downloaded at longmelford-pc.gov.uk/vacancies.

Much Improved Car Park on the Upper Green

The car park on the Upper Green has now been smartly resurfaced with rolled gold stone (similar to that of the Old School car park). The drainage has been improved and smart kerbing fitted by the flower bed. This follows damaged areas of the Green being restored and gates being fitted to stop vehicles accessing the Green when it's wet.

Nature Matters

Welcoming nature into Long Melford

This autumn there was a bountiful harvest of fruit, nuts and berries; a huge contrast to last year when there was barely an acorn to be found. Country folklore suggests that this signifies a long hard winter. When nature doesn't supply a rich harvest, we can help by putting out fruit and nuts in the cold winter months. Don't throw your soft or rotten apples in the bin, put them out on the lawn, especially if there is frost or snow. They will be much appreciated, as will be a bowl of fresh, unfrozen water



Our resident birds will be joined by many more migrating from colder climates in the Arctic and northern Europe for the winter. Our climate and plentiful supply of food attracts many of the thrush family – Blackbirds, Fieldfare and Redwing in particular, plus many others including the beautiful

but tiny Goldcrest and flocks of Waxwing. It's also a magnet for waterbirds coming from northern Canada, Greenland and Siberia.

Improving our green spaces

The Biodiversity Group continues to take any opportunity to enhance our green spaces, including planting more bulbs and plants to encourage butterflies and bees. We're working with Babergh District Council so there'll be more wildflower areas next year. And we'll be looking for more sites for swift nest boxes – if you'd like one, please let me know.

Throughout the winter, the Biodiversity Group will be holding regular working parties to improve the environment at the Country Park and Railway Walk. If you'd like to help, please contact me or Lisa Tipper (tipperl@longmelford-pc.gov.uk).

As we approach the festive season, can I please urge you to think about how sustainable your Christmas is. Could you reduce wastage, use more natural products and give gifts that support nature rather than contribute to the mountain of plastic polluting our planet? If everyone makes a small change, we can ensure our planet and wildlife thrive for our grandchildren and beyond. Happy Christmas!

Gardening Matters – Notes from the potting shed


Fruit tree pruning tips

This is the perfect time for pruning most fruit. The trees which need attention now are those bearing fruit with a pip, such as apple, pear and quince. Removing any dead or diseased material is the first task and then any branches which cross and rub against others. Finally, shorten branches by up to one third, aiming for an open or goblet shape – see diagram. Another way of putting it is that a pigeon-sized bird should be able to fly through a well-pruned fruit tree from any side. Under no circumstances should a fruit tree bearing fruit with a stone (such as plum, damson, cherry or greengage) be pruned in winter as this will increase the risk of disease. They should only be cut between April and August.

Time to prune fruit bushes too

Autumn fruiting raspberries can be cut to the ground now, perhaps leaving a small stalk as a marker to show where the cane is for feeding and mulching in spring. This is also the best time to prune gooseberries, aiming to reduce the bush by at least one third, creating an open space in the centre. This will promote good ventilation and reduce the risk of all disease as well as the dreaded gooseberry sawfly.

Established redcurrants and whitecurrants also benefit from a good tidy up at this time of year. After removing all dead or diseased wood, aim to reduce the top growth by about one quarter. Side shoots from lower growth should be reduced to a couple of buds. Ideally, all cuts will be to an



outward facing bud to promote an open shape as it regrows in the next season. Blackcurrants can also be pruned whilst dormant and the optimum approach is to remove about one third of the shoots each year, cutting back to the base, to promote a steady supply of vigorous new fruit bearing branches.

News flash for 2023 – the Seed Swap is back on Saturday 25th February.

Full details in the next issue. Meanwhile, we're crossing our fingers for an easier gardening year in 2023.

Health Matters

Our GP Surgery has a New Practice Manager – Meet Scott Hanson

Melford Matters interviewed Scott Hanson soon after he started work here in early October. As the Practice Manager Scott will be involved in managing all the business aspects of the practice, making sure that the right systems are in place to provide a high quality of patient care.

From 2018, Scott worked as a Practice Manager in Ipswich. Before that, he was in the Armed Forces for over 30 years, starting as soldier and moving on to admin and finance.

As we reported in the previous issue, our Practice received an 'Inadequate' rating from the Care Quality Commission (CQC) and was placed in special measures in July. A follow-up remote inspection by the CQC has confirmed that some improvements have already



been made and it will revisit the Practice in January 2023 and again around June/July.

Making things better

Scott said, "It's part of my job to prove that continuing improvements are being made and I fully expect the Practice to be rated 'Satisfactory' across all areas by the June/July inspection."

He told us, "The most serious problem for the Practice is recruitment, especially GPs which is a problem across the NHS. Consequently, the Practice is currently only offering same day face-to-face GP appointments. We're advertising for GPs, a dispensary manager and reception and administration staff. If you're interested in a non-clinical role, please email me at Scott.hanson@nhs.net"

Patients complain of long waits for phone calls to be answered. Scott said, "I'm looking at ways to improve our phone system and I'm keen to be totally open with patients. We'll be publishing statistics on our web site about the number of face-to-face and telephone appointments made each week and about waiting times for phone calls to be answered. I'd also like to write for Melford Matters to keep people up to date."

Cricket Club Awards for the 2022 Season




