So, we were delighted to welcome SESAW (the animal charity based in Leavenheath) and the RSPCA (which used the school as a drop-off point for donations).

Groups also attended to recruit new members for Project 7 and for Good Neighbours. Refreshments were provided by the Melford WI, with the chocolate and walnut cake being the most popular.

We will hold the Community Market from 10am to 1pm on the fourth Thursday of each month. So next up: 28th October and a special Xmas-themed market on 25th November.

A New Badge for the Beavers

This term, Beaver Scouts are taking part in a badge called Promise to the Planet. This has four parts – reduce, reuse, recycle, rethink. As part of this, we'll be seen out and about litter picking and carrying out



Melford Junction Model Railway Exhibition

The model railway exhibition in the Village Hall of what the railway looked like in the 1950s in Melford (previewed in our last edition) was a huge success. Best estimates are that around 1,000 people visited. Thanks very much to Nigel Locke and his team for setting it up (which took around four hours) and for running it on the day. As well as the model railway, there were hundreds of photos of Melford in bygone days on display from the Thomas Howlett collection owned by the Museum and Heritage Centre. Tea and cakes were provided by volunteers.



Entry was free but generous donations meant that around £900 (after deducting costs) was raised to support our Museum and Heritage Centre.

Raising Money for the Play Area

The Swan in Hall Street has generously offered to donate the profits from a couple of its new weekend brunches for the benefit of the Cordell Place Play Area. It's also donating the revenue from selling its



filtered water in the Sept to Dec period to the project. The Parish Council is planning to install more equipment in the play area, especially for toddlers, and needs to raise funds towards the cost. Long Melford Silver Band Together Again

After 16 months without a rehearsal together and longer since our last public performance, we're back. After a cautious outdoor start in July we moved rehearsals inside when the general restrictions were lifted.


The Social Club at the RBL is Back in Action

Remembrance Matters

Remembrance Sunday

Last year, because of Covid restrictions, it wasn't possible to hold the usual parade and service at Holy Trinity. But a Remembrance Garden was created around the beacon on the top Green.

Remembrance Sunday this year is 14th November. There will again be a Remembrance Garden around the beacon and a service



is planned at Holy Trinity. Plans for a parade were still under discussion when this magazine went to press "but it will not be as previous years" said Martin Richards, Secretary of the Long Melford branch of the Royal British Legion.

War Memorial in need of repair


Melford's splendid War Memorial in Holy Trinity's churchyard was erected in 1920. Not surprisingly, the intervening 100 years have taken their toll. The stone at the base was built around a wooden core, which has deteriorated over the last century and is causing the stone to crack. The memorial is owned by the Parish Council, which agreed at its August meeting to seek quotations for dismantling and rebuilding the base. The cross above it is in good condition.

A Melford Life Lost at the Front

Nearly 900,000 British military personnel lost their lives in World War I. But it's not until we can put names to numbers that the dreadful loss of life becomes more real. One young man to lose his life was Sydney Arnold Shelley. He was born in Sudbury in 1896. His father was a local baker and by 1911 Sydney was living on the Green in Melford.

In 1916, Sydney was a pupil teacher at Long Melford School. However, having only just taken his teaching exams, he was conscripted into the army in April 1916. He joined the 1/15th Battalion of the County of London Regiment.

On 7th October 1916, Sydney's unit was attacking German lines at Butte de Warlencourt. The attack came under intense machine gun fire killing and wounding nearly 300 men. Sydney was one of the young men to lose his life that day just six months after joining up. He's buried in Warlencourt British Cemetery, Pas-de-Calais. Sydney Shelley is recorded on our War Memorial. His death was a sad loss to the village and to the teaching profession.



Remembrance Matters

A Wartime Schoolboy Remembers

Alan Theobald began school in Melford in the early months of World War II. It's almost impossible for us to imagine what life must have been like for a five-year-old little boy then. We wanted to find out more about Alan's wartime experiences and this is what he told us ...

"There were three classes for the boys according to age. We were taught separately from the girls, we even had different playgrounds separated by a wall. I've got happy memories of us boys climbing up the wall and 'chatting up' the girls.

The youngest class had Miss Smith as teacher – we used to call her 'Old Ma Smith'. The middle class had Mr Rendell who was discharged from the army as he had shellshock. He acted very strangely with us. I wonder what sights he'd seen. He used the cane on us quite often for the slightest thing. He didn't stay very long. Then we had Mr Fox. He was very good and well-respected.

We weren't really frightened of the war. It was normal taking a gas mask to school, hearing the siren go off, having blackouts at night and seeing windows boarded up. When the planes flew over low from Stradishall, and we were in the playground we'd wave to them. Sometimes they'd see us and tip their wings.



I remember that Acton was bombed and that's where the German POW camp was. We used to go and look at them. Some were allowed to come to Melford. A couple of them stayed on in Melford after the war. They married English girls who were mocked by some villagers. One of the ex-POWs was Felix Golynia who started his taxi business with a small car in 1952. Didn't do too badly did he?"

Melford to Light Up Again for Remembrance

The Long Melford Business Association will, for a second year, fund and co-ordinate the *Melford Window Wanderland – Light Up for Remembrance* initiative to commemorate those who gave their lives for our freedom. Last year, over 50 homes, businesses and community groups took part and this year we'd like to encourage even more of the community to join in.

If you'd like to take part, you can register your interest on the official website https://www.windowwanderland.com/area/long-melford/. All those who register will receive a detailed pack of what's required, how to get involved and you'll find plenty of creative inspiration. The event will run every evening from Thursday 11th November until Sunday 14th November between 5.30pm and 8.30pm.

We're also encouraging businesses to display stories of Melford War Veterans in their windows to form a daytime *Heritage Poppy Trail* – last year saw over 40 businesses taking part and we hope for more this year. As well as commemorating the veterans, the displays will give our community the opportunity to learn more about those from Long Melford who gave so much.

Remembrance Matters

The Royal British Legion (RBL)

In 1921, a few war veterans met in the Cock & Bell and decided that they'd meet now and again to support each other and others who had served during the war. After a couple of years, these young men brought their group under the umbrella of the British Legion (not Royal until 1970).

From its London HQ, the RBL campaigns and lobbies in the interests of veterans and their families. Members share experiences and have a say in the way the Legion is run by voting through its branch network. But most importantly, they help the RBL to provide support to the Armed Forces community and their families. The Long Melford Branch is responsible for keeping Remembrance alive locally and helping provide welfare support to local beneficiaries.

You can help keep the RBL strong by joining. Membership starts from just £18 a year and is open to everyone. You'll get our RBL magazine and e-newsletters giving you the latest news on events and stories from inside the Legion. You'll also get some benefits including priority access to tickets for the Festival of Remembrance at the Albert Hall, discounts on certain products and Remembrance tours and access to conferences and RBL clubs.

The pandemic severely affected our activities but things are returning to normal, so we are planning for this year's Remembrance. The Social Club is back open too (see page 7 for more information).

Wartime Eats

At the outbreak of World War II, Britain was heavily dependent on imported food. As supply lines were attacked by the Germans, the newly formed Food Department (later the Ministry of Food) began to

introduce rationing. This started in January 1940 with butter being limited to 4 oz. (113 grams) per person per week, sugar to 12 oz. (339 grams) and bacon/ham to 4 oz. per week. Other meat was rationed to the value of 1/6d (8p) per person per week.

Canned protein such as spam, salmon, pilchards and corned beef were available and country cooks made increased use of wild meat such as rabbit, hare and even squirrel. Parts of slaughtered animals previously overlooked for cooking were now deployed. Offal played an important part, including ox and pig liver, kidneys, hearts, brains, feet, oxtail and tongues. By 1943, whale and horsemeat substituted for beef. Wartime recipe substitutes included left-over porridge instead of brains and lentils instead of lamb in shepherd's pie.

Making these items into tasty meals was, of course,

much more of a challenge without the huge array of herbs and spices we now enjoy.

Whilst rationing was a necessary device to ensure fair distribution of limited resources for a nation facing extreme challenges, it did, in fact, create a healthy, balanced diet.

Parish Council Matters

In July, Babergh's Planning Committee deferred a decision on Bloor Homes' detailed planning application for 150 homes on 'Skylark Fields'. The Babergh planning officer had recommended approval. But the Planning Committee asked for some aspects (e.g. the number of 4-bedroom homes, greater variety of house styles) to be revised.

Since then, the Parish Council has had two three-way meetings with Bloor and Babergh planners to discuss the way forward. Bloor has made some significant changes – fewer 4-bedroom homes and more 2- and 3-bed, more houses with rendering (including 'Suffolk Pink'), two houses and walls with

'flint/stone detailing', cabling for electric vehicle charging points and water butts for all homes and reducing CO₂ emissions to a certain extent.

The Parish Council is pressing for even fewer 4-bed homes, more bungalows and 2-bed homes, more flint/stone homes, especially in places visible from the Melford Walk, and for Bloor to be aspirational and make this an exemplar development for water and energy savings.

The Parish Council want to avoid a repeat of the sudden disruption in August caused by installing traffic lights and parking restrictions at the entrance to the site without sufficient consultation and notice for residents. They're pressing for stricter rules during the construction phase to minimise disruption and for regular consultations between Bloor and the Parish Council.

It's likely that by the time you read this, Babergh Planning Committee will have met again to consider the revised proposals.

Cycling on Melford Walk and other issues

At its August meeting, the Parish Council voted to allow cycling on the Melford Walk and there will be changes to the signs to reflect this. It also voted to re-open the public toilet next to the Council office in Cordell Road once hot water for hand washing is provided. Babergh has granted planning permission for gates to be erected on the Upper Green so that vehicles can be prevented from driving onto and damaging the Green when the ground is wet.




School Matters

Locality Fund and from Long Melford in
Bloom we now have a polytunnel. It was erected
by a fantastic team from the Village Volunteers.
By the time you read this, we should have had our
opening ceremony and then it's all things grow.

The term ended for our Nursery with a visit to Rainbow Fun in Sudbury. Our Year 6 had *Celebration*. This included a water fight, family picnic and a leavers' assembly.

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Gardening Matters - Notes from the potting shed

A huge thank you to all who helped make the Seed Swap such a great event. Seeds and gardening stories were swapped all morning. We had such a good time that we're planning to make this an annual event.

Speaking of annual events, we've been asked to make something like the Sunflower Challenge a regular part of the village calendar, but growing something different each year. We suggest that in 2022 as many of us as possible grow sweet peas in front of our homes so that everyone can enjoy them. It's worth mentioning that you can get them started in October, store them in a cold frame or somewhere similar over winter and then they will have a head start for growing next year.

We were thrilled with all the sunflower pictures you sent in and hope you like the montage of them opposite. If there's anything beautiful in your garden irrespective of the season, please photograph it and send us the pictures so that we can try to feature them in future issues.



Well, how has your harvest been this year? Overall it's been much easier than usual at the allotments as it's rained just when our thirsty crops needed it. If you've grown pumpkins and squashes, it's well worth hardening them off in the sun for a week or so before storing them for later use. We find that they'll keep well in a shed up until the end of February if their skins have had that chance to harden off.

Seeing the reference on page 12 to wartime food issues led us to research how allotments fitted into this picture and we discovered that by the end of the Second World War, there were almost 1.4 million allotments in this country and 75 per cent of food was locally produced. Not sure we'll ever manage quite that in Melford.



Just one more tip: if you have leaves gathering in your garden, do consider making leaf mould from them. All you need is to contain them in a pen of chicken wire (or an old compost bag with a few holes in the bottom will do) and just keep adding to the heap. Leave them to decompose somewhere out of the way and next autumn you'll have beautiful crumbly leaf mould which can be used as a growing medium, a mulch or soil improver.

Also, a note for the diary: some fabulous potted bulbs for Christmas will be available at the **Library Christmas Fair on 27th November**. But remember, they sell out fast ...

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Nature Matters

Welcoming Nature into Long Melford

By the time you read this summer will have passed, the swallows will be heading back to warmer climes whilst those creatures staying with us fill up their winter larders. Please keep leaving food and water out for hedgehogs as they need to fatten up before hibernation and start feeding the birds too. To help our smaller creatures, don't do too much tidying up in the garden (seed heads are excellent for overwintering insects) and plant bulbs to provide nectar for bees early next year.



The Biodiversity Group has been busy with practical work and



planning how we encourage nature into the village. A group of hard-working volunteers has done some initial clearance along the Melford Walk Nature Reserve (aka the Railway Walk), both to encourage greater biodiversity and make it more accessible for walkers. However, there's lots more to do over the winter months. The Parish Council is responsible for this work but our group, working with Suffolk Wildlife Trust, provides advice on how to improve it for wildlife and will coordinate surveys to establish what flora and fauna lives there. Our vision is for this area to be one where nature thrives and is enjoyed by everyone, just as in the Country Park.

We're working with Babergh District Council to create wildflower meadows on areas currently mown by the Council. Areas in front of Southgate Gardens and Harefield and in the Chadburn/Raile Walk and Sampson Drive areas have been suggested. This isn't about leaving grass unmown it's about planting and managing the areas with a special wildflower mix to encourage more flowers and associated insects. If these areas prove successful, we could do more in future.

What you can do to help

Encouraging nature requires everyone to do their bit. I hope the activities below will encourage you to join in and learn more about how we can all do something to help our fascinating but declining wildlife. For updates, please look on the Long Melford Facebook page and notice boards around the village.

- Saturday 30th October, 10am-noon at the Village Hall. 'Bringing Wildlife into your Garden'. A talk by Cathy Smith, Suffolk Wildlife Trust. Suitable for all ages.
- Saturday 13th November to be confirmed. 'Planting Tree Seeds'. Before this date children will collect wild tree seeds and nuts and bring them along to plant up. They will then be grown on for planting in the village in future. Advice on suitable species will be provided.
- **Saturday 27th November** meet at the Village Hall at 9.30am for Tree and Hedge Planting Day. The free trees/hedging plants provided by Babergh will be planted out. Volunteers please contact me!

Our Library's Future

In March, the URC confirmed that the local church community had agreed to close. As the article above shows, the



library provides much more than traditional lending services. It stages events and provides activities for a number of Melford groups. Consequently, news of the URC's closure has caused some anxiety for library users.

We contacted Suffolk Libraries who told us that they are fully committed to maintaining a permanent presence in the village. James Powell, Marketing and Communications Manager, said "The building itself is owned by the URC Eastern Synod Trust which leases the library space to Suffolk Libraries. There is a six month notice period on this space and no notice has been given, so we can reassure local people that the library will be staying where it is for the foreseeable future. We are hoping to renegotiate the current lease and have no plans to move the library. We are committed to maintaining a library in Long Melford, preferably at its current site, and we would look for an alternative should this be necessary."

Congratulations to the Long Melford Pharmacy

You often hear praise of our village pharmacy but, over the past eighteen months, the team there has gone above and beyond to help keep us all safe and supplied with essential medications. They anticipated that there might be increased demand for home delivery of medication and acquired an additional van in preparation for that. The drivers and other staff have all worked extra time to ensure that people received their drugs safely at home. The level of extra demand has remained since the last lockdown ended and the team say that they are prepared in the event of another surge of the virus.

Perhaps the greatest achievement of our local team of seven people, with help from an additional six in a dedicated vaccination team, has been with the

vaccine roll out. Melford pharmacy was one of the first in the country to offer jabs. By September, it had delivered around 25,000 since it started providing this service in early February 2021, protecting people from the age of 16 up to almost 100.



Not only have these been provided at the pharmacy itself, but also on a vaccination bus which delivered almost 6,000 jabs in July alone. It has been travelling across North East Essex and Suffolk since June, delivering jabs in places such as Colchester, Haverhill, Harwich and Mildenhall. They even provided this service at the Latitude Festival where they resisted the temptation to pop out and see the bands. They wore tee-shirts which carried two encouraging messages – 'Every vaccine counts' and 'I had mine at Latitude'. Natasha Jones, the pharmacy store/services manager told us, "Latitude was an enlightening experience and we are extremely proud to have been the first vaccination bus at a festival in the world".

This fantastic contribution to the local vaccination effort has been recognised recently with a Suffolk Hero Award from the House of Commons in recognition of the team's huge efforts with battling the pandemic. The team has also been nominated for a Community Pharmacy Award and shortlisted for a National Independent Pharmacy Award.

In addition to managing all the regular duties at the pharmacy, the team also maintains its social media presence, as they work hard to keep relevant posts coming, seeing this as "an effective and crucial form of communication".

Melford Pharmacy is a village asset to be very proud of and grateful for. On behalf of the village, Melford Matters congratulates you all on your recent award and thanks you for all your work for the benefit of the whole village.

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
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Matters Spiritual - a message from the Rector

date yet again.


We're determined to cut the ribbon and pop the champagne corks as soon as we can. Meanwhile some dates for your diary.
